

# WORK FOR HENRY GEORGE,

## THE CAMPAIGN COMMITTEE BUSY.

### MAKING PLANS TO RAISE MONEY—HOW EXPENSES WILL BE SAVED.

The Executive Committee appointed on Thursday night by the labor convention at Clarendon Hall met yesterday at No. 141 East Eighth-st. to prepare for the campaign. John McMakin, of the Operative Painters, called the meeting to order, and George Block, of the Bakers, was secretary. A resolution was adopted declaring that no individual nominations should be made or approved in the various Assembly districts, but that the whole force of the organization be concentrated on Henry George. John McMakin was selected to manage the campaign and will devote his entire time to the work. He will be paid until election his regular trade wages, \$3 50 a day. The following committees were selected: on Finance—B. J. Hawkes, Concord Labor Club, printers; J. H. Casserly, United Order of American Carpenters and Joiners; and J. Wilkinson, International Custom Tailors' Union. The Assembly Districts—John Devist, Operative Painters; H. Emrick, Cabinetmakers Union No. 7; and Hugh Whoriskey, United Order of American Carpenters and Joiners. On Mass-Meetings—J. P. Archibald, Paperhangers; Joseph Geis, United Clothing Cutters, and Ludwig Jablinowski, Cigar-makers' Union No. 90. On Printing—John Moran, Excelsior Labor Club; Matthew Barr, Tin and Sheet Iron Workers; Thomas Ford, Brass Workers, and George Block, Bakers. On Ways and Means—Joseph Geis, L. Jablinowski, M. Barr, H. Whoriskey and J. Wilkinson. John McMakin is the president of the committee, George Block secretary, and B. J. Hawkes treasurer. It was decided to establish headquarters for the campaign at No. 141 East Eighth-st., and they will be formally opened to-morrow. The secretary was authorized to hire such clerical aid as he might need in conducting the campaign. A resolution was adopted inviting the business and professional men's committee to appoint a sub-committee to act with the workmen during the campaign. After the adjournment of the meeting some of the members met Mr. George and held a long consultation with him. The subject of the conference was not given out for publication.

The question of money to run the campaign is a serious one with the committee. Many of the usual election expenses will be saved by the committee. In the matter of workers at the polls, watchers and challengers there will be no expense, as a sufficient number of volunteers have already offered their services to man every election district in the city thoroughly. There will still be much money needed to cover legitimate expenses. A great majority of this will be raised by voluntary subscriptions. At the meeting of the Central Labor Union yesterday \$500 was appropriated for campaign expenses. Word was received from New-Haven that the New-Haven Trades Council had passed a resolution to raise all the money possible to contribute to the campaign fund. Similar action has been taken by the New-Haven Printers' Union the St. Louis Central Labor Union and other out of town bodies. Nearly every trade and labor organization in this city will raise funds either by assessing the members or by requesting individual subscriptions. The matter of funds for the literary department has been taken in hand by the Rev. Dr. Edward McGlynn.

The Freeso Painters' Union has requested permission to furnish a large banner to be hung up in front of the headquarters in Eighth-st., and the Steam and Gasfitters' Union has offered to put in all the fixtures needed free of cost.

The committee of business men were busy yesterday making preparations for the mass-meeting to be held on Friday night. Among the speakers, who have already consented to be present, are the Rev. Dr. McGlynn, Louis F. Post, James Rodpath and Professor D. De Leon.

Organization meetings will be held in the Vth Assembly District, at No. 96 Attorney-st.; and the IIIrd Assembly District, at 392 Bowery, to-night; the XVth Assembly District, at No. 477 Ninth-ave., to-morrow night, and in the IIrd Assembly District, at Catherine-st. and East Broadway, on Wednesday night. The Executive Committee will meet again on Wednesday night.
