

STRIKERS FOLLOW RED FLAG.

Brickmakers Parade Along the Hudson, Near Newburg.

NEWBURG, May 1.—An indignant mob of over 1,000 men formed a picturesque May Day procession along the east shore of the Hudson River between Dutchess Junction and Chelsea to-day. In the crowd were Hungarians, Syrians, Italians, and negroes. At the head of the gang was a Syrian carrying an immense red flag on a pole. The men who followed him carried big clubs.

The first band of strikers organized at the Budd brick yard, at Dutchess Junction. They marched to five yards below Fishkill Landing, and readily induced all the men to join them. Then they took up the march northward, walking on the New York Central tracks. Passing Fishkill Landing, they reached seven other yards, and when they got to the Mead yard at Chelsea the gang numbered over a thousand. The men then returned south, each stopping off at their respective yards. Only one case of violence was reported. A man who at first refused to join the strikers was beaten on the hands with clubs.

The strikers demand higher pay.
