## MEETING OF GEORGE MANAGERS.

The Law Committee of the Henry George Campaign Club met yesterday afternoon at the Colonnade Hotel and organized as a permanent Law Committee of the United Labor Party, with the following officers: Gideon J. Tucker, Chairman; A. A. Levy, Vice-Chairman; F. O. Leubuscher, Secretary, and James P. Koehler, Treasurer. Sub-Committees on Legislation, Consultation and Advice, on Ways and Means, and on Receiving Complaints were appointed.

The last named committee was authorized to hire a stenographer and counsel and will hold evening sessions at No. 141 Eighth-street. The members said they had already received 55 complaints with regard to buildozing, bribery, false registration, and false personification of voters, and thatseveral policemen were implicated. They also received the names of 36 liquor dealers who kept their saloons open within the proscribed limits.

A conference of those men who took a leading part in the George campaign was held in the evening in the hotel, but they declined to say what they had done.

The Executive Committee of the Campaign Committee met at No. 141 Eighth-street and decided to reorganize the party all over the city.
